

Trinity Family,

The "Star-Spangled Banner," the national anthem of the United States, interestingly enough comes from War of 1812, a conflict that was an extension of the war for independence. This anthem, written by Francis Scott Key, symbolizes the resilience, courage, and spirit of hope of the American people.

The War of 1812 was fought between the United States and Great Britain. Some of the reasons were that he British attempted to restrict American trade and they impressed American sailors into the British Navy. There were also tensions that came from the United States desiring to expand its territory.

In September 1814, British forces attacked Fort McHenry in Baltimore, Maryland. This fort was a vital defense for the city and its harbor. The British intended to capture Baltimore. For 25 hours, the British navy bombarded Fort McHenry, unleashing a heavy barrage that lit up the night sky. The fort's defenders, however, held their ground, despite the overwhelming firepower they faced.

During this battle, Francis Scott Key, an American lawyer, happened to be on a British ship. He was there to negotiate the release of an American prisoner. Watching the attack, Key anxiously waited to see the outcome of the battle. When dawn broke on September 14, Key saw the American flag, the "star-spangled banner," still flying above Fort McHenry. This sight inspired him to write the poem "Defense of Fort M'Henry," which would later be set to music and become known as "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Freedom is rarely given. It often must be fought for, and the struggle must continue in every generation because there are always people and forces from within and from outside the country who see our freedom as an opportunity to grasp what we have for themselves. The "Star-Spangled Banner" had its roots in the War of 1812, and particularly the Battle of Fort McHenry, but it speaks to a resolve of the American people to enter into the struggle to cherish and protect what God has given us as a nation. May our flag always be there because we don't let it fall.

Happy Independence Day! God bless and protect the United States of America!

Sometimes It's Hard to Ask for Help



COUNCIL NOTES—from the May 8, 2024 Meeting

President Jerry Gass called the meeting to order at 6:02pm. Council members in attendance were Norman Eubank, Jerry Gass, Pastor David Mayer, Sheri Riley, Karen Steiger, Hal Switzer, and Karen Wagner. After 17 years, Medora Beckmann resigned from her Treasurer's position, effective May 1st. Hal Switzer made a motion to appoint Keith Morgenroth to replace Medora on the Church Council. Sheri Riley seconded the motion, and the Council members present approved the motion. Pastor David based his devotional on Romans 12:6-21...Living the Christian Life as the Holy Spirit empowers us to do so.

There were two minor corrections to the Minutes of the April 16th Council meeting. Karen Steiger thanked Sheri Riley for doing a great job filling in for her as Secretary at the April meeting. Norman Eubank made a motion to accept the Minutes as corrected, Karen W seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion.

Sheri gave the Financial Report through April 2024. Three CD's and the TLC Operational Checking Account are at Texas Regional Bank. Other monies are at Security State Bank & Trust, and with Thrivent. There was no Treasurer's Report for April 2024. With the resignation of Medora Beckmann, effective May 1, 2024, Council approved Sheri Riley to be the authorized signor on the church's accounts along with Gerald (Jerry) Gass, President of the congregation.

A realignment of duties for the Financial Secretary and Treasurer were discussed. Sheri would collect the offerings, make the bank deposits, and sign the checks. Keith would do more extensive reporting on Trinity's financial position.

Pastor presented his report for May. A discussion took place on how Trinity will handle funeral Honorariums. Pastor proposed a set procedure for members and non-members that can be given to the funeral director as well so that he/she can address the matter when visiting with the families.

Committee Reports:

<u>Youth & Education</u> – Ashley gave her report via conference call. She reported that Cameron Anderson had received a \$2,000. Scholarship from Trinity, and will be honored on Senior Sunday, May 19th. VBS registration is full at 113 students. The preparation is going well. This year's Summer Camp (Jun 21-Jun 25) theme will be "Defender" taken from Psalm 62:6. Ashley has plaques of the baseball teams that Trinity sponsored this year that will be displayed. Flag football will kick off June 10th with 45 players participating so far. The Walk-a-thon was held May 5th, and so far, almost \$4,000. has been raised.

<u>Stewardship</u> – No report was given. A thank you note was received from Layla Lukich for the Confirmation Cross that she received from Trinity.

Evangelism – Karen W reported that the next 5th Sunday Potluck will be held June 30th. Ham will be provided.

Worship – No report was given.

<u>Property</u> – Norm submitted his written report. Routine maintenance plus extra landscaping to include cleaning out the gutters and getting a quote for trimming trees on church property. All 8 units of a/c and air handlers were checked. The Fellowship Hall painting project was completed. The Sanctuary Carpet replacement/installation is in progress. Norm hopes that if all goes well the carpet will be installed this week and Sunday worship can go on as usual. He is waiting for a quote to install auxiliary parking lot lights.

Jerry still needs to talk to Sally Anderson about making a banner to put on Seymour Garage's fence. Hal is still working on electronic giving possibilities. A printed policy was distributed concerning crosses displayed on the Fellowship Hall wall. The Council decided which crosses to display as Memorials.

New Business

- The 1st Sunday Breakfast in June will be the 2nd Sunday, June 9th because of VBS. The Council decided to honor Medora for her service on Sunday, June 2nd with a certificate of appreciation designed by Wayne Gosnell, a plaque, a bouquet, and a gift certificate.

Upcoming events include the study of Revelation in Sunday School, Harvest Workers on Mondays, Thursday mornings is Bible Study with Pastor on Genesis, Thursday evenings is The Chosen, and the Women's Game Day was held today with 8 women attending. There will be a Women's Group Gathering on the third Tuesday evening of each month coinciding with the Men's Group Gathering. The first gathering will be at Barb Eubank's house on May 21st at 6:30pm. The Men's Group meets at Kevin Hawkin's house also on May 21st at 6:30pm.

If You Build It ...?

Growing up in Eastern Iowa in the late 1980s, it was big news when a major motion picture began filming a baseball movie on a family farm. In the movie, *Field of Dreams*, a mysterious voice is heard from beyond: "If you build it, he will come." As the story unfolds, the lead character plows under his crops mid-growing season to build a baseball field. Then from out of the cornfields beyond centerfield appeared a historic team from baseball lore.

The cultural impact of *Field of Dreams* was significant. Visionary leaders seized upon the infamous movie line and adapted it for their own organizations: "If you build it, they will come." Even pastors and churches adopted the mantra as ministries scaled bigger and better programs and church facilities, trusting in the idea that new and bigger would attract more people. To some extent, this approach seemed to work! As churches engaged in expanding and improving their ministries and facilities, more people were attracted to it and began engaging with churches in news ways.

Despite these successes, there were also unintended consequences. Fast forward two decades and churches discovered that what once worked was no longer working. Successful ministries needed to be constantly refreshed and renewed with the latest and greatest programs or building renovations to keep people coming. A consumer mentality crept into the church as church attendees began "church shopping" and congregations felt the urge to "compete" with one another.

Church growth began to feel like chasing after a pot of gold at the end of a rainbow. How many churches "built it" but the people did not come? While God certainly used the church growth movement, we now recognize the ways it detracted from an authentic faith journey of following Jesus.

What if the church adopted a new mantra based upon an old idea: "If you love them..." How would you complete that sentence? What do you think the result of sharing Jesus' love might be? For me it would be this: "they will know they are loved by God." I believe that God is calling us to shift our focus from building better programs and facilities just to entice people to come to the church to hear the Good News towards equipping and mobilizing the people of the church to love people and engage in Gospel mission in their everyday lives. #LoveWorks2024

What is a Life Team?

A Life Team is a Gospel-motivated group of church members that communicates and shares the abundant love of Christ as it relates to life issues within the church and the community. We are part of the Lutherans For Life Frontline that spreads the Life message to the individual congregations where they live. Members are equipped through specialized training and are then available to help the pastor with what otherwise might be an overwhelming task. Life Teams are unified, trusted teams that the pastor can utilize to provide life-issue expertise, consistent initiatives, and access to dedicated resources. A Life Team will also help the pastor engage and inform the congregation from the pulpit, through Sunday school, and through youth and adult education about the importance of protecting the sanctity of human life at all stages.

Trinity's current Life Team consists of Barb Geistfeld, Life Team Leader, Jim Geistfeld, and Arlene Hamlin. From 2012 to 2017, it was just Jim and Barb. In August of 2017, three new members went through the required training and became certified: Arlene Hamlin, Claudia Smith, and Sabrina McGrath. We were all installed as a Life Ministry of Trinity on October 29, 2017. Though we are now down to three members, our current Life Team is still affirming the sanctity of life at all ages and stages in multiple ways. An annual Sanctity of Life Sunday has been held now for several years, complete with a life-

affirming bulletin insert from Lutherans For Life. Mother's Day and Father's Day bulletin inserts support and encourage Christian moms and dads. Resources like LifeDate and brochures on life issues are made available to all. We have continued to distribute the 80 and Over gift bags at Christmas. We continue to promote the support of the SHARE pregnancy resource center with our annual Baby Bottle Boomerang.

But we would like to do more. There are so many Life issues we have not addressed. Just look at the iceberg! We would like to have more special projects that would involve our youth, minister to our older adults, and teach all of us about the life issues that surround us. Life Thoughts-Bib Project!! Barb Geistfeld--Life Team Leader

You may know that members of Trinity knit and crochet prayer shawls for those in need. In other churches, this ministry is expanded to include lap blankets and other items for residents of nursing homes and assisted living facilities. But did you know there is one item these places *always* need but *rarely* get. Adult-sized bibs! Yes, bibs. Bibs are used to protect the clothing of the wearer...whether it is a baby, an older person, or someone with a disability that impairs their ability to feed themselves. Because they are worn several times a day and may have to be washed after each use, they wear out quickly. This means there is likely to be an ongoing need for these.

August 21, 2024, is National Senior Citizen's Day. In honor of our seniors, the Life Team is announcing an *on-going* project to provide *adult bibs* for whomever needs them. A quick search on Amazon revealed a Simplicity pattern for adult-sized bibs. You may also find this and other adult-sized bib patterns at your favorite fabric store.



Here are some suggestions from *Sophie Johnson, our resident expert*: These facilities need bibs for both men and women. Fabrics that can be worn by either sex are more easily distributed. But having some that are distinctly masculine or feminine is also good! Don't be afraid to use some unique (maybe wild) fabric patterns.

Make sure the bib is long enough to cover the entire lap. Take the pattern pieces, hold them in place on a volunteer, and measure where their length ends. You may want to extend the pattern pieces to allow making a regular version and a longer version.

Use high quality Perma press fabric with generous seam allowances and a standard stitch count. These will be washed often. The better the fabric quality, the longer the bibs will last.

Some patterns show bibs that are open down the front. <u>Use solid front patterns</u> for the best protection.

Velcro attached at the ends that go around the neck are the best. Easy on, easy off.

Sewing adult-sized bibs may be a novel idea for you, but you may be surprised at how gratefully these bibs are received. We may even find someone in our own congregation that would be glad to receive a bib. In the end, know that providing a gift that is truly needed will bring joy and satisfaction both to those giving and to those receiving. Happy sewing!!
