

Martin Luther and Five Major Contributions

The last Sunday of October is Reformation Sunday. It is a good time for us and the church as a whole to remember the person and the ideas that propelled the Reformation and inspired many expressions of the "Evangelical" faith. Here are some of the key contributions of Martin Luther:

1. The Ninety-Five Theses and the Protestant Reformation

- **Contribution:** In 1517, Luther famously nailed his **Ninety-Five Theses** to the door of the Wittenberg Castle Church, challenging the Roman Catholic Church's practices, especially the sale of indulgences (which claimed to reduce time in purgatory). This act is often seen as the spark that ignited the Protestant Reformation.
- **Impact:** Luther's critique led to widespread religious and political changes across Europe. It resulted in the formation of Protestant denominations and a break from the Roman Catholic Church, reshaping the religious landscape.

2. Translation of the Bible into the local German language

- **Contribution:** Luther led the work of translating the Bible into German, making it accessible to ordinary people who did not understand Latin, the language of the Church at that time.
- **Impact:** Translating Scripture into the language of the people allowed individuals to read and understand the Bible for themselves, reducing reliance on clergy for religious knowledge. It promoted literacy, unified the German language, and encouraged the translation of the Bible into other languages.

3. Justification by Faith Alone (Sola Fide)

- **Contribution**: Luther championed the doctrine of "justification by faith alone" (sola fide), affirming the New Testament's teaching that salvation is a free gift of God's grace, received through faith in Christ, rather than through good works or the purchasing of indulgences.
- **Impact**: This biblical principle became a cornerstone of reforming churches. It emphasized a personal relationship of trust in God's gift in Christ and turned believers away from a works-based view of salvation.

4. The Priesthood of All Believers

- **Contribution**: Luther promoted the idea of the "priesthood of all believers", which held that all Christians have direct access to God without the need for an intermediary priesthood. Every believer has an equal standing before God (Luther: "We are all equally priests…no man can make himself higher than another."). According to Luther, the vocation (calling) of every believer is sacred, whether it is as a pastor, farmer, teacher, or parent. He rejected the idea that only those in religious orders or clergy had a holy calling. Luther elevated the dignity of everyday work as a way to serve God. (Luther: "All who are baptized may claim that they are already consecrated priests, bishops, and popes.") This did not eliminate offices such as pastor, but rather elevated the calling of every believer to serve God and neighbor and serve the cause of the Gospel.
- **Impact**: This belief empowered laypeople to take a more active role in their faith, empowering every believer to see their life as a representative of God on earth.

5. Reform of Church Practices and Liturgies

- **Contribution:** Luther advocated for reforming church worship, eliminating many rituals and sacraments. He focused on preaching and the centrality of Scripture in worship.
- **Impact**: Luther's reforms influenced the development of new liturgical practices, including congregational singing, services in the language of the people, and a focus on preaching the Word.

We will look at some of the contributions of the Lutheran Reformation on Reformation Sunday in October and during the month of November.

Notes from the August 14, 2024 Council of Ministries Meeting

President Jerry Gass called the meeting to order at 6:04pm. Council members in attendance were Norman Eubank, Jerry Gass, Travis Kersten, Pastor David Mayer, Keith Morgenroth, Sheri Riley, Karen Steiger, Hal Switzer, and Karen Wagner.

Pastor David gave a devotional taken from Hebrews 11-12, "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see". Surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses ...Biblical heroes who bore testimony to the power of faith and to God's faithfulness... let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith" as we are guided by The Holy Spirit and make wise decisions as Church Council members.

There were no corrections to the July 10th Council meeting minutes. The <u>Action Items</u> were discussed. Travis made a motion to accept the Minutes, Sheri seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion. Sheri gave the Financial Report through July 2024. Keith gave the Treasurer's Report as of July 31, 2024. Pastor submitted his report for August 2024. Among the items included was Trinity hosting one of the livestream sites of the Global Leadership Summit held on Aug. 8-9. It was well received, and Pastor hopes to do the same thing next year hopefully emphasizing more participation from Trinity members and people from the community. Travis made a motion to except Laura Smith Walla as a member of Trinity. Norman seconded the motion, and the Council approved the motion.

Committee Reports:

<u>Youth and Education</u> – Karen W reported for Ashley that she handed out 60 backpack tags and 30 keychains during the Blessing of the Backpacks and Meet the Teacher events. 14 New Teacher Boxes were handed out between the 3 BISD campuses. These boxes were assembled during the VBS Missions project. The Youth Sunday School program kicks off again Sunday, Aug. 18th with an Ice Cream Sundae Sunday. A major Camp Fundraiser will be the Spaghetti Lunch, followed by Bingo held on Sunday, Oct 6th. October 11-13 is the Girls' Retreat held at The Lost Cypress Ranch near Kendalia. The theme will be ...We saved You a Seat. A Prayer Cross with a paper pad & pencil has been added to the outside of the Youth Room for anyone who wishes to include prayer requests. The Lucky Leaf 4-H Club has requested to use our Fellowship Hall the 4th Monday evening of each month from 6-7pm. Travis made a motion to allow the Lucky Leaf 4-H Club to use our Fellowship Hall each 4th Monday evening, Hal seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion.

Stewardship - No report was given.

<u>Evangelism</u> – Karen W and Sally are still working on a banner for Seymour's Garage fence. Our next 5th Sunday Potluck will be September 29th.

<u>Worship</u> – Travis reported that Sheila in the Media Room is working on a schedule to train Grayson Culton to make slides in her absence. The Rocky Road Band will provide music on Sunday, Aug 25th, and then again on Sunday, Sept 22. Americana Gospel Music is their genre.

<u>Property</u> – Norman submitted his report. Mike Blasi did some necessary carpentry work. Norman, Angie, and Hal restored the Memorial Cross Wall in the Fellowship Hall. Norman announced that the auxiliary parking lot lighting project has been put on hold for the time being. Hal announced that Briana Crenshaw will probably close her coffee truck business and will gift the power pole she had to have installed to Trinity.

Hal made a motion to accept all the Committee Reports, Karen W seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion.

Old Business – The Communion Assistants Schedule was updated as follows: Oct. 13, Hal Switzer and Oct. 27, (*Reformation*) Karen Wagner

The Congregational Meeting held on Sunday, November 10th will be the election of Council Officers whose terms are expiring and will include updating the Congregation's Constitution By-Laws revising job duties of the Council Treasurer & Financial Secretary.

Pastor David and Karen S gave a short report on the LCMC District Gathering held at Zion Lutheran Church in Kerrville on July 26-27. The keynote speakers Greg & Susan Finke were very good, and Pastor is considering getting copies of their book <u>Joining Jesus on His Mission...How to Be an Everyday Missionary</u> for each Council member as a good resource in moving the Congregation forward. Pastor David will be attending the LCMC Annual Gathering & Convention, Sept 29-Oct 2 in Marion, Iowa. The Council Retreat will be held Sat., Oct 19 in the Fellowship Hall.

<u>New Business</u> – Travis made a motion to allow Keith Morgenroth to be a signatory for the Thrivent Accounts, Hal seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion.

- Hal is going to put together a Nominating Committee for the Officer elections on November 10th and reported that as he begins to formulate the 2025 Budget, he will use the current budget and make changes as they are brought to his attention. Hal is going to put together a Budget Committee that will present the 2025 Budget, awaiting membership approval at the Annual Congregational Meeting in January. He also announced that the insurance company (Brotherhood Mutual) that Trinity uses has changed its structure, and they need a new proxy signature of an authorized representative.

Council decided to table the request from The Johnson City Christian Food Pantry for a donation. And concerning the upcoming Young Life Fundraiser Banquet Monday, September 23rd, it was decided to not participate in funding the Banquet, but instead continue to support them with our quarterly contribution of \$200.00.

Travis suggested that Trinity might host a Teacher Appreciation Luncheon, perhaps on the Teacher Workdays at the beginning of the Spring semester. Three shifts for the 3 different campuses involves about 150-200 teachers & staff. The hosting pastor would have the opportunity to pray over the staff of the entire school district. Sheri made a motion to pursue the idea of Trinity hosting a Teacher Appreciation Luncheon in January 2025, Keith seconded the motion, and the Council approved the motion.

Travis, also, announced that Trinity could still sponsor a sign on the Football field fence. He would get all the information and give it to Angie to finalize the sponsorship. Upcoming Events were discussed. Angie will be on vacation August 26-29. Keith made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Karen W seconded the motion, and the Council members approved the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00pm with everyone reciting The Lord's Prayer.

Mission Moment

A Mission Minded Lament

Last week I received the following email from a concerned church member offering a heartfelt and faithful lament for the mission of the church. I asked for his permission to share it with you anonymously:

I was going through some old documents at my parents' house today. I came across an old bulletin and I was at first amazed... and then scared. I grew up in a small town in Texas. Our Lutheran congregation was the big church in town, but not the only church. As I think back, everybody I knew went to some church.

The bulletin dated December 2, 1956 showed the attendance the previous Sunday had been a whopping 255 people! And this was no fluke: the attendance on Thanksgiving Day was 212! The 1960 census population for the town was a little over 600 people. In other words, this Lutheran church had regular worship attendance of more than 40% of the whole town's population while numerous other churches thrived nearby. Fast forward to today and that same church reports and average worship attendance in the 80s while the town's census population grew by 30% between 1960 and 2020. Today, about 10% of the community's population is in worship at this church. In 67 years, the attendance fell by 65% and the attendance as a percentage of population fell by 75%!

The attendance figures in my hometown church struck me to my core. Are we (the Church) doing something wrong? How do we deliver the Good News (law and gospel) to this generation? Are we missing some huge opportunity to get people to listen? For, if they do not hear, how can they believe?

I know that we can never bring back the past, but the Gospel can change the future and make it even better. Many people today feel hopeless, helpless, and numb. The news constantly talks about the divide among people: liberals and conservatives, skin colors and nationalities, rich and poor, religious people and the unchurched. Many people do not acknowledge their sin, are not willing to forgive and cannot comprehend faith, grace or salvation.

Contrary to the news reports and popular opinion, I believe that love, hope and joy exist in this world and are prevalent in the Church. The real Church is not angry old people criticizing sinners; nor is it Puritans conquering Satan. The true Church is the fellowship of saints who have grievously experienced sin, mercifully accepted forgiveness, and found the love, hope and joy that abounds within them as a gift of God's grace. And they freely and joyfully share these gifts with others (especially those different than themselves) through their everyday lives.

If this was how the Church was known in the world, do you think people would want to listen? How do we (including the whole LCMC) become that kind of Church? Any ideas? Lots of prayers and contemplation. Enough for now.
